words from the leader

It's that time again!

It has been a while since I have been able to catch up with you, but I'll keep it as short as possible.

At long last we can open the office again after what seems to be forever, albeit in a restricted way.

Paul, our lovely front office person, is now back and is looking forward



to seeing you again. He has temporarily moved, still at the front door but in a funky office now!



We have been able to reopen the **pop-up cafe** alongside the **community fridge** on Tuesdays and Thursdays. It has been lovely to see so many people out enjoying the sunshine, coffee and cakes but more importantly, enjoying catching up with friends and neighbours. We have expanded slightly so that we now offer a hot lunch on Thursdays for those who wish, again giving folk the chance to sit and enjoy some lunch out in the open air with friends.

The community fridges in both Coffee Hall and Netherfield are going from strength to strength and between them are preventing approximately 2 tonnes of food per week from going into landfill! That is a lot of lovely food that is no longer going to waste.

We have taken the decision not to have our parish wide **festival** this year as we think it is probably better not to encourage a large gathering while there are still some uncertainties but we will be supporting the estate based events that I know are being organised now. I hope to see many of you there. Keep an eye on social media pages for more updates.



There will be other things taking place over the summer and beyond, with the **play rangers** out and about during the summer holidays, as will the **community development team** in our trailer - look out for them. I

am aware that there will be gardening projects, litter picks, and much more, again keep an eye on the social media page.

On a less positive note, we have been hearing of several instances of **anti-social behaviour** recently, vandalism and large gatherings of young people intimidating younger children. Please talk to young people about the importance of being a good citizen and making positive contributions to the community. We all live here, and we all have the right to enjoy it, however old or young we are! There also seems to be an increase in fly tipping, so please report any that you see so that they can be dealt with quickly, these piles have a habit of growing overnight if we don't.

I would also like to thank you for your patience while we catch up with the **landscaping**. You have probably noticed that some areas are looking greener than usual. The perfect growing weather we have had of late has meant that nature has had a growth spurt. Couple that with the bird nesting restrictions, lockdown and staff holidays it has literally crept up on us. Parks & Green Spaces

Woughton is lucky to have loads of parks and green spaces within the parish. From large sports pitches to quiet spots under the shade of trees, there is usually somewhere close by where you can enjoy some nature, some sunshine (if you're lucky) and some leisure time.

Sadly, not everyone looks after the spaces – we get regular reports of broken glass, litter, needles, and vandalism. We see residents making a **MASSIVE** effort (see the Beanhill Litter Pick), only to have their work undone by lazy, selfish, ignorance.

So how can we all work together to try and make sure that our parks, our play equipment, and our green open spaces are safe, secure and suitable for all?

1. Take your litter home with you. If there isn't a bin, or if the bin is full, take your litter home. Whatever you came with, you can take away – no excuses, no 'but there should be more bins', no 'but everybody else does it' – it's your rubbish, you're responsible so manage it.

2. If there are concerns, please do report them (see the numbers below). We and our partner agencies can only get things sorted if we know about them. Whilst we try and make sure we visit everywhere regularly, if you see a problem, give us a shout and we can usually get it sorted pretty quickly.

3. Please be considerate of others who are using the space – the parks are there for everyone, but sometimes there are times when different groups want different things. If there are children using the park, please don't smoke and swear and make it unsafe for them. Similarly, if there are people playing football on a field, maybe somewhere else would be better for a picnic! There are loads of spaces to use – play nicely.

4. If you wouldn't want someone doing it in your garden, don't do it in the parks – no nipping for a quick wee, no barbeques (except in designated areas), no loud parties or drunkenness – the parks often back onto residential properties, so please be considerate.

The green spaces are managed by different organisations – some by us, here at Woughton Community Council, some by Milton Keynes Council and some by The Parks Trust. We would always advise that you contact MK Council first (it is mostly them), but we are always happy to advise and have access to the maps that show who owns what.

Remember – these are your spaces in your neighbourhoods. Please look after them and let us know if we can help.

Hello residents of Woughton, especially Leadenhall

I am very pleased to represent you as your Community Councillor once again. Having lived on Leadenhall since July 2002 and speaking to many of you, I understand the main issues that affect our estate.

We do have a Residents Association with a Facebook group, please, join us, the more the merrier and there is strength in numbers.



The reason I set the Residents Association up was to gel our fragmented estate together, which is made more difficult by us not having a primary school or shop, places where friendships are often formed, I ask you to help me achieve my goal, by joining our group and becoming involved in sharing your ideas of ways we can meet, may be a picnic on the green with games for adults and children, more litter picks, coach outing or hire a hall for a fun afternoon or evening.

Traffic and parking, as in most areas, is a huge problem made worse for us due to having three large educational establishments, Milton Keynes highways is going to be approached to carry out a traffic survey, probably not until September when all establishments are running at full capacity, and seek to find some way of reducing the volume of traffic, whether by staggering school times, traffic lights, one way system or if you have ideas that can be used, please contact us.

COMMUNITY engagement

Do you want to make changes on your estate? Want to contribute to making your community better, but you don't know where to go to help? Well, look no further

We consult with residents as a parish on how to prioritise spending of the precept, which is the parish part of the council tax, on projects in the wards. We at Woughton Community Council then put these in to a service plan that officers will help us to achieve.

We have Councillors that do things very differently. Some work quietly in their communities, helping residents cope with day-to-day problems and referring if they need further help. Some are more publicly engaged but how you do it is entirely up to the individual. Residents get involved in this level of government through various ways, working in / with resident Associations, some through working with Milton Keynes Council or by hearing about being a Councillor, but whatever way we would love to see more. This Council has until 2023 before going up for election again, unless we have a casual vacancy through someone standing down beforehand.

As a Councillor, you will get IT support and training, along with other training available to assist you on committees, like finance training or mental health awareness or any other that will help you in your personal development. Working up into higher positions in the council, Vice chair/chair of committees, working groups or representing the council on outside bodies. You will be summoned to meetings and legally have to attend 1 every 6 months but here at Woughton we think that morally you signed up to represent your estate and residents expect more than that.

If you still feel that you would like to become involved in your community, either through Resident Association or Parish Council then please do not hesitate to contact chair of your Resident Association on your estate or Steve McNay, Council Manager regarding parish Council involvement either as a Councillor or as a volunteer.

I do hope that this has informed and assisted in some way and would love to see you getting involved in making Woughton better.

RESIDENT ASSOCIATIONS

Most of our estates have Resident Associations on them. Beanhill, Coffee Hall, Eaglestone, Leadenhall, Netherfield and Tinkers Bridge. Peartree Bridge had an Association up until recently but struggled to get members. Redmoor and Bleak Hall are Industrial estates. We support our Associations by providing free hire of a community centre if there is one on the estate or we pay for hire locally for monthly meetings and provide £500 annually for running costs.

On the next level, all of our estates have Parish Councillors representing residents, how many depends on the size of the estate.

- Tinker's Bridge **1**
- Peartree Bridge **2**
- Eaglestone **4**
- Beanhill **3** (also looks after Redmoor)
- Coffee Hall **4** (also looks after Bleak Hall)

PARISH COUNCILLOR

A Parish Councillor means being part of the first tier of Local Government, sitting under Milton Keynes Council. You have (more than likely) been elected to represent your ward in meetings, participating in the decision making for the Parish as a whole.

E-scooters –

what's the deal?

Many of you will know about electric scooters, or 'e-scooters' that have become part of our world over the past few years. Any privately owned e-scooter cannot be ridden on public land (roads, paths, redways) and so use remains illegal.

HOWEVER...

Here in Milton Keynes, there are currently a few 'pilot' schemes running, to see whether e-scooters should be part of the future of transport, what the challenges are and how things might work. Here in MK, there are three companies that are part of the trial: Lime, Spin and Ginger. In total, there are around 900 scooters for use, and the companies all have a similar set up, with similar rules that govern use:

Speed restricted, with the possibility of switching off or restricting speed further in set areas,

Agreement that during the trial, these scooters can be used on redways but NOT on pavements and can otherwise be ridden anywhere a bicycle can be ridden (although possibly restricted on grid roads),

Over 18 with a driving licence (full or provisional),

Helmets are not a legal requirement but are encouraged.

There are areas that are protected by 'geo fencing' – this is where the scooter tells the system where it is at all times and when it approaches a place which is restricted, the scooter either stops, goes really slowly or the rider is unable to proceed any further and has to turn around.

Some problems that people have noted are that sometimes the rules aren't being followed and sometimes the scooters are left in unsafe places once the ride has finished. Riding too fast, scooters being ridden by people under 18, no helmets being used all cause concerns and the fact that scooters are left wherever, even if this is blocking a path, is also cause for concern.

As with many new things, it is going to take a while for the full impact of the new scooters to be fully understood – there are often teething problems that need some changes to be made. This might include stronger checks on licences and ages, limits to where you can leave scooters and better use of the 'geo-fencing', to protect areas where dangers are more likely, for example around schools, shops, residential homes, etc.

We have spoken to Thames Valley Police about this issue and they have taken action against some unlawful use and will continue to keep an eye on things. But you can also help by reporting to the companies where there are issues – this way, they can also take steps to keep everyone safe. They have records of each scooter, where it is, where it has been and which

account is using it, so if there are problems, please do get in touch with the companies (details below).

The bins of change

Woughton Community Council have implemented a dog bin renewal scheme, with the aid of donations from residents for our wonderful biodegradable dog poo bags.

Most of our dog bins have been doing good service for 12 or more years and it's now time for a change. As each bin costs around £300 to replace – and we have 39 in the parish – this will be a gradual process. Those that can be 'refreshed' for the time being will be, whilst the most badly damaged or that need relocating, will be replaced.

Although there is some budget allocated for bins, the majority of this is for the emptying of the bins on a weekly basis by a specialist contractor. So the donations for bags will help speed up the renewal process.

Our bins are emptied weekly – usually Mondays, and there is a four weekly cycle of bin bag colours so you can check whether a bin has been missed. Please phone the office if you think one has been missed.

Two new bins have been installed already

– there will be notices on the old sites explaining where the bin has been moved to.

Men in Sheds

Men in Sheds started in 2017, working on one day a week.

After working from the Woughton Council offices for a while, we were offered premises in a on Barnfield Drive on Netherfield – this was a rundown 'depot' that needed a lot of work doing to make it suitable.

We put an extension in place, updated the electrics with working sockets and lighting. We created work areas like a cutting room and preparing room, kitchen, toilet area and equipment that we were lacking.

After a lot of hard work, we were able to help vulnerable, disabled and any member to volunteer to learn new woodworking skills and safely use tools. This helps people get back into the community and maybe back into work.

We train our volunteers in a **safe, friendly atmosphere** and provide safety equipment and training. We are a non-profit organisation – all funds raised go back into the group to update tools, buy materials, and reach more people.
