I want to say a big Thank You to the **Youth team** for providing much needed play times on each estate through Play Rangers, and other staff members joining the councillors on the trailer days. We were pleased to start engaging with the communities again.

Children will have started going back to school, and routine bought back. Christmas decorations have appeared in the shops (gets earlier each year).

We have seen Buckland Lodge demolished and Cripps Lodge has started to be demolished making room for much needed **council homes**. We have seen Anthony the Pharmacist from Peake Pharmacy on Beanhill, leave to go to Pastures new (closer to his London home). Good Luck Anthony in your new position and thank you for all you did for Woughton.

We Councillors will get back to looking at the **budget** for next year, and trying to find out the gaps from Milton Keynes Council services as they look to save £45m from their budget, so we will be coming round estates finding out what services are important to residents so that we can try and bridge those gaps. **Please look out for consultation forms** and come and chat to us about your priorities.



In these difficult times looking at new, innovative ideas to engage with residents we have been continuing with our council meetings online. We are really pleased with how many people are watching them and engaging with questions etc - Instead of Councillors and maybe 1 or 2 residents, we have been having 100's of viewings, and that's a good thing. Please keep watching and engaging with us through our Facebook page.

Isolation has been a huge problem in Woughton, so we are looking at doing more things to get people out and about safely, like our pop up **"How have you Bean" café** on Coffee Hall on **Wednesday afternoons** (weather permitting) **1-3pm** and we are still looking at ideas so keep your eyes peeled for more info.

Is it really autumn already? This year seems to be flying by despite the challenges that Covid-19 has presented.


Since my last column we have started to tentatively venture out. Unfortunately, it is still not the right time for us to have our offices fully open, but we are doing our best to come to you. Over the summer we came out into the Parish to reconnect with you all - we visited every residential estate weekly (weather permitting). It was lovely to get out and talk to you all again. **The Play Rangers** came out and young people played on our green spaces and took part in several projects like 'Love Rocks'. It was great to see them all out playing and laughing in the sunshine again. Thank you to the staff and councillors that made this all possible.

We also opened a socially distanced **pop up cafe** on the green space next to the offices - it's a pleasant way to spend a sunny afternoon just having a chat and a cuppa.

The Community Fridge is now back in its original home and is still doing a fantastic job at preventing unnecessary waste going to landfill, with our partners and suppliers keeping us on our toes (who knew there was such a thing as a melon?!). Again, a massive thank you to our brilliant volunteers and all those who keep the fridge open and more than that, it just keeps building. Please pop along and see what's available.

The environment team have been busy catching up with the landscaping and dealing with as many fly tipping incidents as we are able - please bear with the team they are doing their very best to get us back shipshape again.

As we approach autumn we start to think about **budgets**. Every year it is difficult to fund all of the projects that we would love to do but this year it's going to be even



harder. Covid-19 has already impacted on our budgets and I think that will be the case for a while longer yet. We have seen increased numbers of residents needing help from our advice services and our mental health teams - lock down has affected many people. I am also aware that people have lost their jobs or had hours reduced. We are still committed to helping as many of our residents as we possibly can, however we can, but we need to hear from you about what matters to you. We will be creating opportunities for residents to talk to us about budgets and what we provide. I am always more than happy to chat about the services we do offer - you will be amazed at the range of projects we cover.

I would love to be able to look forward to Christmas events but at the present time I'm not sure if there will be any. I am hoping that we can assist the Residents Associations to make sure that Santa makes an appearance in as many areas as possible so please keep in touch for updates.

As I write this the Covid-19 numbers are rising, so please keep yourselves safe and follow the **'Hands, face, space'** advice so that we can get the numbers on a downward trend again and hopefully we will be able to see each other soon.

A Strange and Unusual Summer.....



Summer 2020 has been strange. With lockdowns, social distancing, office closures, mask wearing, hand sanitising and all the other challenges, it hasn't been the same as other years.

There was no festival, no fun days. No events happening. Trips with Resident Associations were put on hold. Schools were closed. Offices shut. Everything went quiet. But the sun shone. People got out into the parks and open spaces. The roads were quieter, and nature thrived – we've seen squirrels and foxes and badgers. The birds have been singing and more insects than usual.

And slowly, things started happening again. We managed to hold **30 Play Ranger sessions**, with hundreds of attendances. We took the trailer on the road, visiting estates and offering information, reusable drinks bottles, face coverings and a chance to come and say 'hello'. The Community Fridge re-opened, with more than 5 tonnes of food saved from going to waste between the middle of July and the start of September. And we trialled taking the fridge on the road too, with almost 20 kilos of food at the first session.

We also started the 'How've You Bean' pop up café, providing a chance to come and have a drink and cake, outside in the (mostly) sunshine and have a catch up. We are hoping to be able to continue this over the autumn and hold it on other estates too – watch our Facebook page for updates.

Our meetings moved online, with hundreds of residents tuning in on Facebook to watch proceedings. Our Friday updates have been viewed thousands of times, giving a weekly overview of the changes, what is happening and some local history.

And residents and community groups looked after each other. They distributed food parcels. Collected prescriptions. Cooked meals for those at risk. Did shopping and made a point of stopping by to say 'hello'


to those who were isolated, shielding or alone. They held socially distanced activities, from Easter Bunny hide and seek to activity packs for children. They did all the things that we have come to expect in Woughton, with the fantastic community spirit across the parish.

At the time of writing, the restrictions have just come back into force with the **'Rule of Six'** starting – having been moving back towards some sort of normal, we find ourselves back in a place where activities, visiting family and friends and re-starting things has paused – whilst we know that people want to get back to normal, we have to protect those most at risk. This means that masks, washing hands, keeping distances, and staying safe are essential.

Despite these challenges, we are still looking at **what we can do**; youth services can continue, with safety measures in place. Our advice and wellbeing support is still there, either online, over the phone or face to face (socially distanced!). Landscaping and Environment are continuing to deliver, despite the challenging situation. The Community Fridge is open, the pop-up café will continue, and other events will happen, as long as we can do that safely and in line with the regulations.

We would like to thank you all for your support during this difficult time – we know it has been hard for many of you and hope that the limited activities that we have been able to provide have gone some way towards helping. We would also like to thank all of you who have gone the extra mile within your communities over the past few months – you have made a huge difference and made the situation more bearable. Thank you for wearing a mask, thank you for keeping your distance. Thank you for helping the parish to stay safe and well. Whilst we have sadly lost some people, Woughton has been better than many areas and that is due to you all playing your part. We look forward to better times to come but in the meantime, many thanks again for everything.

HELP WANTED

When our family first moved to Beanhill it became apparent that Beanhill was a friendly community. We were made welcome by some of the residents and told about many of the things in the area.

On my walkabout I saw many green spaces, some of which were overgrown and made the area look somewhat unkempt - full of weeds and brambles these areas are not just bad to look at but causing many issues to the fences and properties. These must be dealt with as a priority and along with my fellow councillors and the Beanhill Residents Association, we intend to get these areas done. Thankfully the WCC Landscaping Manager is a decent bloke and is willing to help us and reschedule the annual cuts for Beanhill to tie in with our deep cut which we are aiming to do soon. This can only be done with the support of you! **We are asking you all to help us help you**, working street by street starting at areas off Medale and Maslin. We are asking residents when we are at your street please come out and help, be it 10 mins or an hour it will all help us get through more and quicker.

There has been a program of **replacement streetlamps** to LED - these are more cost effective and less maintenance. Some residents have complained about the brightness or positioning of the beam. Can I ask that any resident that has issue please email me with details of lamp number found on post and your details. I am compiling a list to then pass on to contractor and hopefully they will look at ways to alleviate issues, this however still is at MKC discretion and will be dealt with as a case by case.

Our Residents Association have been working tirelessly throughout the pandemic and have done **an excellent job**, from delivering shopping to collecting prescriptions, going to have a chat to serving hot meals to the most vulnerable. There are too many to list, but they have done a sterling job and as a community we should all thank them for their commitment.

The **Moorlands Centre** has also been doing excellent

work and we are hoping to see some more joint projects supporting our community. Debbie and her team have done their best and I look forward to continuing our relationship.

Some have criticised the council's actions immediately after the virus broke, be it MKC or WCC. There was an initial freeze after virus break out but they both seem to be full steam ahead where they can now. WCC have done plenty from meals to food parcels to guidance and support for the vulnerable. They have, in my opinion, supported our community as best as they could during this frightful time.

As a councillor and resident there are many things I wish to do and helping my fellow Beanies is one. This brings me to the upsurge in petty and not so petty crime. We are a community which is no way considered affluent and many of us have had many forms of struggles to cope with, be it Covid 19 or the serious flooding which wiped many out including any money they had. Yet there are certain low life's that are taking advantage of our residents and helping themselves to whatever they can. Not only is this wrong but to do it to this community in time of need is despicable. We must help each other as best as we can so if you see something not right report it. By doing so you may be helping someone losing items which they cannot afford to replace. We all deserve to live in a area where we feel secure and part of the larger community but we need to pull together.

Finally, although Beanhill has not had much in the way of events this year the team of people from WCC / MKC / BHRA / Moorlands and many more have been working in the background to help bring events to Beanhill when times are better. WCC has during August been in the community on Tuesdays helping bridge that gap and be available for a chat, alongside the Play Rangers who have been out doing their bit to help our youngsters have some well needed fun. I thank them for that.





Time for a nappy change?

Lockdown has given many of us time to think and reflect about our lives and our impact on the planet. There has been a huge shift away from using disposable nappies in the last few months, with more and more new parents choosing washable cloth nappies, also known as real nappies – so much so that many suppliers have been struggling to keep up with orders!



Forget terry squares, these days modern washable nappies are close-fitting, easy to use with velcro and poppers, no pins, no soaking and come in beautiful colours and prints. Just flush the poop down the toilet and place the nappies in the washing machine – easy! With an average baby getting through 4,000 disposable nappies, these reusable nappies are great for the environment and are cost effective too.



There are four basic types of real nappies:

- Pre-folds are flat nappies that need minimal folding before use
- Shaped nappies are sewn into position, so no folding is required
- Stuffable/pocket nappies consist of a wrap with a built-in pocket where the nappy is inserted
- All-in-one nappies have the nappy and wrap sewn together

"I decided to use reusable nappies when making a conscious effort to reduce our household waste; I hated the idea of such a huge unnecessary contribution to landfill. I could not believe how beautiful they were with lots of lovely prints; I was also impressed with how slim fitting and absorbent they are." MK mum Kerry and baby Riley.

The programme for the coming months is:



This all takes time, but we continue to work towards building upon the really lovely green spaces and planting across the parish.



Woughton Men in Sheds



Woughton Men in Sheds was formed in 2017 in the Community Centre on Coffee Hall. We were there for approximately 12 months.

We then moved to Netherfield on Barnfield Drive where we took over a disused landscape depot. With our small membership we built a shed which joins the existing build and from there we have started making things for the community, plus bespoke items from large Facebook customers.

We are open 3 days a week from 10 am till 4pm where we make all our products from recycled wood.

We are looking for more members to come along and join in our activities of making wooden products - from planters to small sheds all made from wood that would otherwise go to landfill.

Our membership is open to anyone from the age of 18 to 80. Come along join in - there is no joining fee and membership is free and with that if you come to help us you get teas coffees and if there all day, some lunch!

We also welcome our facility to women who would like to learn some woodwork skills which you can do after training on our machines. I could go on and on about us but just come over to Barnfield Drive - we are between Beadlemead and Langland just turn up have a chat and a cuppa and see if we can blow your blues away.


